



Met sales (Millions of yen)






Total assets, Interest-bearing debt

To Our Shareholders and Investors



I am pleased to announce the results for the fiscal year ended December 31, 2009 and to thank our shareholders and investors for their loyal support.

During the fiscal year under review, the economic slowdown continued as harsh conditions persisted. Although the OTSUKA Group made various proposals for achieving cost reductions and improving productivity, net sales declined 8.0% from the previous fiscal year to \pm 429,927 million due to the trend by companies to curtail IT investments and reduce expenses.

At the earnings level, gross profit declined due to a decrease in the gross profit margin and lower net sales, and despite efforts to curb selling, general and administrative (SG&A) expenses, operating income declined 40.6% to \$16,094 million, ordinary income decreased 40.5% to \$16,427 million and net income was down 38.9% to \$8,782 million.

Management has resolved to pay year-end dividends per share of \$130 in line with our efforts to return profits to shareholders, who have given us their support.

In the coming fiscal year, despite the uncertain direction of the economy, we will further strengthen our contact with customers and strive to identify customers' IT utilization needs. In working to realize our Mission Statement, the OTSUKA Group will continue to pursue management reforms to ensure the trust of all stakeholders. Your ongoing support is greatly appreciated as we move forward with these endeavors.

Overview of Consolidated Operations

Economy Picking Up, But Still Faces Harsh Conditions

During the fiscal year, increased exports and production spurred a pickup in the Japanese economy, as business confidence improved in certain areas and corporate bankruptcies diminished. Nevertheless, the resiliency of the recovery was weak owing to sluggish domestic demand and deflation, and harsh economic conditions persisted throughout the fiscal year. Additionally, companies continued to curb investments in facilities and equipment as well as IT investments.

System Proposals that Lead to Cost Reductions, Improvement of Productivity and Strengthening of Competitiveness

Amid this environment, the OTSUKA Group carried out its operations under the fiscal 2009 slogan of "Vitalize office via IT and live up to customers' trust." In keeping with this slogan, we worked to strengthen our community-based sales structure while firmly ascertaining the circumstances of our customers and their IT investment needs. We also actively proposed systems for helping to solve management issues facing customers, namely, achieving cost reductions, improving productivity and strengthening competitiveness. Additionally, we focused on undertaking a campaign to commemorate the 10th anniversary of our "tanomail" office supply mail-order service business as well as on offering low-priced, fixed-line telephone services, as we proactively worked to expand business with existing customers while also cultivating new customers.

External Environment

Economy is starting to pick up but is still facing harsh conditions.

Exports and production are picking up; however, the resilience is weak due to a decline in domestic demand.

Business confidence improved in certain areas and corporate bankruptcies are diminishing.

Medium- and small-sized companies still facing harsh conditions.

Companies are continuously cutting back on investment in facilities and equipment.

Despite the need for IT utilization, IT investments are continuously being curtailed.

Sales Down 8%, Approximately 40% Decline in Respective Profit Categories


As a result of the preceding circumstances, despite an increase in the number of customers during the year, sales per customer declined from the previous fiscal year and net sales decreased 8.0% to ¥429,927 million.

Turning to profits, gross profit declined due to lower sales and a decrease in the gross profit margin, and despite efforts to curb selling, general and administrative (SG&A) expenses, operating income declined 40.6% to ¥16,094 million, ordinary income decreased 40.5% to ¥16,427 million and net income was down 38.9% to ¥8,782 million.

Cash flows





Net cash provided by operating activities amounted to \$15,982 million, an increase of \$2,635 million from the previous fiscal year, due to a decrease in income taxes paid.

Net cash used in investing activities declined \$2,033 million from the previous fiscal year to \$4,927 million due to a decrease in payments for purchase of investments in securities.

Net cash used in financing activities increased \$826 million to \$5,417 million.

Overview of Results by Quarter

Net Sales


Net sales expanded steadily to the second quarter (April-June) of 2008, but turned downward from the third quarter (July-September).

Net sales in the third quarter (July-September) of 2009 amounted to \$93,763 million, a 9.6% decrease from the previous third quarter. Net sales in the fourth quarter (September-December) of 2009 amounted to \$108,003 million, 2.1% lower than in the previous fourth quarter.

Ordinary Income

Ordinary income also increased steadily to the second quarter (April-June) of 2008, but began decreasing from the third quarter (July-September).

Ordinary income in the third quarter (July-September) of 2009 amounted to ¥1,221 million, down 61.4% from the previous third quarter. Ordinary income in the fourth quarter (September-December) of 2009 amounted to ¥3,959 million, down 26.8% from the previous fourth quarter.

Overview of Business Segments

System Integration Business

The System Integration business provides optimized system services ranging from consulting to system design and development, transport and installation work and network construction. During the fiscal year, sales of SI-related products declined sharply owing to the adverse effects of curtailments in IT investments by companies. Consequently, net sales in the System Integration business declined 14.9% to ¥226,688 million.

Service and Support Business

The Service and Support business provides customers with total service and support for their business operations and installed systems encompassing supplies, hardware and software maintenance, telephone support and outsourcing.

With companies continuing to reduce expenses, our "tanomail" office supply mail-order service business steadily secured an increase in sales due in part to the effects of the implementation of a sales campaign. On the other hand, our "tayoreru" support business recorded sales at a level only slightly above the amount of the previous fiscal year, as customers re-evaluated the contents of their service contracts and cut back on the use of copies.

As a result, net sales in the Service and Support business rose 1.1% to ¥200,938 million.

Other Business

In the Other business, net sales increased 20.1% from the previous fiscal year to 2,300 million.

Focusing Efforts on the Accumulated Business


OTSUKA CORPORATION places special emphasis on office supply and maintenance agreement services as the "accumulated business" within the Service and Support business.

The accumulated business is not easily impacted by fluctuations in the economy and is steadily achieving growth annually. As such, this can be said to be a cumulative or accumulation business.

In fiscal 2009 as well, sales in the accumulated business grew steadily, increasing ¥3,900 million, or 2.1% and accounting for 46.8% of net sales (non-consolidated basis).

OTSUKA CORPORATION will continue to focus on the accumulated business as it works to raise the stability of its operations.


Accumulated Business (Non-consolidated)








OTSUKA CORPORATION maintains a well-balanced composition of customers, with the corporate scale of the Company's customers ranging from major enterprises to small- and medium-sized firms.

In terms of annual net sales, in fiscal 2009 the ratio of companies with annual net sales of \$10 billion and above declined, while the ratio of companies with sales of less than \$1 billion and companies with sales of \$1 billion to less than \$10 billion both increased.

Key strategic businesses were generally impacted by overall curtailments in IT investments and reductions in expenses, and growth rates slackened or fell below the levels recorded in the previous fiscal year.

Among key strategic businesses, the "tanomail" office supply mail-order service business recorded steady growth. Color copiers accounted for 75.7% of copier sales.

Topics

LED Advertising Billboard Installed in Tokyo's Shinjuku District

An OTSUKA CORPORATION advertising billboard, one of Japan's largest LED advertising billboards, was installed on the roof of the Shinjuku Kaleido Building alongside the large railway bridge west intersection in the Shinjuku district of Tokyo. Illumination of the billboard began on February 1, 2010. Although this large billboard stands about 12 meters high with a total length of around 74 meters (the front and left sides), it reduces CO₂ emissions by approximately 40% compared with similar billboards illuminated with fluorescent lights. This reduction corresponds to the amount of CO₂ absorbed by 2,005 50-year-old Japanese cedar trees annually.

OTSUKA CORPORATION supports companies' environmental initiatives, including solutions that utilize LEDs. Applying an array of know-how, including that gained from the recent installation of the billboard in Shinjuku, we will also provide environmental solutions for offices and households. We aim to use our recently installed billboard to promote a wide awareness of the benefits and practicality of LEDs, while also raising recognition levels of our "tanomail" office supply mail-order service business advertised on the sign.



Outlook for Fiscal 2010

Strong Needs for IT Utilization

The direction of the Japanese economy is uncertain. On one hand, there are expectations of a mild recovery driven by external demand, while conversely, the economy appears to be approaching a standstill due to the weak self-resilience of the recovery, sluggish domestic demand and the waning effects of economic stimulus measures. Companies are still maintaining a prudent approach toward capital investment and there are concerns that a recovery will lag.

At the same time, however, there are also strong needs by companies for utilizing IT to reduce costs and enhance productivity. Besides demand for replacing and upgrading IT, including for updating systems introduced in response to the Y2K problem, making environmental responses by introducing power-saving products and responding to the implementation of

IPv6 (preparations for IPv4 address exhaustion), there are expectations that the IT market will be stimulated by Windows 7, Windows 2008 Server R2, server virtualization technologies and WiMAX and other high-speed wireless communication services.

Under these conditions, in keeping with its fiscal 2010 slogan of "Live up to customers' trust via IT and Vitalize office," the Group will strengthen customer contact by placing greater emphasis on one-stop solutions and one-stop service and propose highly effective systems that utilize the Group's total strengths. These include comprehensive proposals and combined system proposals that link mission critical systems with information systems, as well as proposals for making network improvements.

IT Market Forecast in 2010

- Economy is starting to pick up but there are uncertainties about the future.
- Corporations are prudently investing in equipment.
- Nonetheless, company needs for IT utilization, replacement and upgrades are brisk.
- Weak growth is expected in the first half of the term and the market is anticipated to recover after the second half of the term.

Strategies by Segment

In the System Integration business, we will focus closely on IT investment trends according to company size, while further promoting comprehensive proposals and combined system proposals that combine copiers, computers, telephones, facsimile machines and communication lines.

In the Service and Support business, the OTSUKA Group will strive to further expand sales volume in our "tanomail" office supply mail-order service business, which will include upgrading our line of new products as well as enhancing our lineup of "TANOSEE" private brand products. In our "tayoreru" support service business, we will offer a new menu of services that are not reliant on hardware.

Forecast for Fiscal 2010

In fiscal 2010, the Company forecasts a 4.9% increase in consolidated net sales to \$451,000 million, a 3.8% increase in operating income to \$16,700 million, a 3.5% increase in ordinary income to \$17,000 million and a 4.3% increase in net income to \$9,160 million.

By segment, we forecast a 6.0% increase in net sales to \$240,330\$ million in the System Integration business, a 3.7% increase to <math>\$208,340\$ million in the Service and Support business and a 1.3% rise to <math>\$2,330\$ million in the Other business.



Corporate Governance

Basic Stance Regarding Corporate Governance

Based on a corporate ethic and spirit of compliance spelled out in its Mission Statement, the OTSUKA Group aims to adapt nimbly to changes in the environment and augment its competitiveness by ensuring thorough compliance and raising both operational transparency and fairness.

Current Status of Implementation of Corporate Governance Measures

As a company with a Corporate Auditors system, OTSUKA CORPORATION aims to augment corporate governance by further enhancing the General Shareholders Meeting, augmenting the auditing capabilities of Corporate Auditors, reforming the Board of Directors and making an active and ongoing commitment to disclosure and investor relations (IR) activities.

1. Enhancement of the General Shareholders Meeting

The OTSUKA Group believes that enhancement of the General Shareholders Meeting is crucial to improving corporate governance, and is working to ensure that as many shareholders as possible attend meetings, while concurrently introducing an electronic voting system that will allow shareholders to exercise their voting rights via the Internet.

2. Board of Directors

As of December 31, 2009, the Board of Directors consisted of 12 Directors, of which 11 board members concurrently serve as Executive Officers responsible for making decisions and overseeing business operations based on actual on-site conditions. There are no outside directors at present.

The Board of Directors meets regularly once a month to discuss critical management issues as well as to deliberate on progress regarding businesses performance and make swift decisions toward resolving relevant issues. Group Management Meetings comprising top management of all Group companies are also held to clarify operational conditions at each company and make progress in achieving profitability in addition to working to strengthen corporate governance.

As of March 26, 2010, there were 13 Directors.

3. Executive Officer System

OTSUKA CORPORATION introduced the Executive Officer System on July 1, 2003, and has since been working to realize more rapid decision-making in regard to management policies and execution of business operations as well as to strengthen the oversight structure for more efficient business operations. Consequently, the Board of Directors handles overall decision-making for important management matters as well as supervisory functions pertaining to business operations. Executive Officers elected by the Board of Directors are responsible for execution of business operations as decided by the Board of Directors and under the direction of the President. As of December 31, 2009, there were 32 Executive Officers, (11 of whom are Directors). As of March 26, 2010, there were 32 Executive Officers (12 of whom are Directors).

4. Corporate Auditors System

OTSUKA CORPORATION uses a Corporate Auditors system. The Board of Corporate Auditors is comprised of four auditors that include two outside auditors, all of whom attend such important meetings as Board of Directors meetings and management meetings to monitor that the management of operations is being properly carried out. The Corporate Auditors reinforce auditing at the operational level through such means as identifying potential problems at an early stage by regularly engaging in dialogue with management via the Board of Corporate Auditors along with independent auditors, as well as by collaborating and coordinating with internal departments conducting auditing of subsidiaries and affiliates.

No personal, capital or business interests exist between outside auditors and OTSUKA CORPORATION.


6. Status of Monitoring Operations

Critical items that impact operations and performance are reported immediately to the Board of Directors and the Board of Corporate Auditors as they arise. Moreover, the Office of Auditors under the direction of the President has been established to conduct periodic and on-demand internal audits of all operations and assess the adequacy of policies, plans and procedures, the effectiveness of their implementation in operations and progress in compliance, as well as to offer concrete advice and recommendations for improving operations and raising awareness. The Office of Auditors has 15 staff as of December 31, 2009.

OTSUKA CORPORATION has established and operates an Internal Reporting and Improvement Proposal System that allows employees to directly report and propose improvements to the President. The purpose of the system is as follows:

- To quickly identify, address and prevent occurrences pertaining to dishonesty and misconduct in relation to corporate ethics and fair trade
- To assess, suitably handle and prevent such incidences as abuse of authority and sexual harassment
- To receive proposals and consultation, as well as to individually address issues related to business operations and work flows

As of December 31, 2009, the structure for corporate management decision-making, business operations and oversight is as follows:



The following measures were implemented recently to strengthen corporate governance.

(As of March 2009)

1. Participation in Electronic Voting Platform for institutional investors

Beginning from the Annual General Meeting of Shareholders convened in March 2009, OTSUKA CORPORATION is participating in the Electronic Voting Platform for institutional investors operated by Investor Communications Japan (ICJ), Inc. By participating in this platform, we have progressed with the creation of an environment that makes it easy for institutional investors, including foreign investors, to exercise their voting rights.

Remuneration for Board Members

Remuneration for Directors and Corporate Auditors in the current fiscal year is as follows.

Directors 15 ¥354 million

Auditors 4 ¥31 million (two of whom are outside auditors, ¥9 million)

Notes:

- 1. The above includes three directors who retired at the conclusion of the 48th Annual General Meeting of Shareholders convened on March 27, 2009.
- 2. Remuneration to Directors does not include compensation for services rendered outside the realm of their directorships.
- The amount of annual remuneration for Directors is up to ¥650 million as approved at the General Meeting of Shareholders on March 13, 1990 (although this does not include employee compensation).
 - 4. The amount of annual remuneration for auditors is up to ¥50 million as approved at the General Meeting of Shareholders on March 30, 2005.
 - 5. The above remuneration includes the increased amount of retirement benefits for Directors in the current fiscal year.
 - 6. In addition to the above, based on a resolution at the 48th Annual General Meeting of Shareholders convened on March 27, 2009, the Board paid ¥94 million as directors' retirement benefits to three directors who retired at the conclusion of the aforementioned General Meeting of Shareholders (excludes provision for directors' retirement benefits that were listed in previous business reports, including the business report for the fiscal year under review).

Number of Directors

The Company's Articles of Incorporation as of December 31, 2009 stipulate that the number of Company Directors shall be 19 or fewer.

Requirements for Resolution of Director Appointments

The Company's Articles of Incorporation stipulate that a resolution for appointment of Director requires attendance by shareholders with more than one-third of the voting rights of shareholders capable of exercising such rights, and is decided by a majority of shareholders. In addition, a resolution for appointment of Director shall not be decided by cumulative voting.

Requirements for Special Resolution of the General Meeting of Shareholders

The Company's Articles of Incorporation stipulate that a special resolution of the General Meeting of Shareholders, pursuant to Article 309, Paragraph 2 of the Companies Act, shall be adopted when it is approved by a vote of two-thirds or more of the voting rights present at a General Meeting of Shareholders, a quorum for which shall be the presence of shareholders of one-third of the aggregate voting rights of the total shareholders capable of exercising such rights. This aims to facilitate efficient operation of the General Meeting of Shareholders through the moderation of special resolutions at the General Meeting of Shareholders.

Purchase of Own Shares

The Company's Articles of Incorporation stipulate that the Company shall be able to purchase its own shares through market transactions based on a resolution of the Board of Directors as prescribed under Article 165, Paragraph 2 of the Companies Act to enable the execution of a flexible capital policy that responds to changes in economic conditions.

Interim Dividends

The Company's Articles of Incorporation stipulate that based on a resolution of the Board of Directors, the Company can pay interim dividends with the date of record being June 30 of each year.

Business Risks

The most common risks that could potentially impact the Group's business performance results and financial condition are outlined below. While these are the most common risks, they do not represent all potential risks.

The items covered herein are possible future occurrences determined by the OTSUKA Group as of March 26, 2010.

Customer-related Risks

The OTSUKA Group's customers range from large enterprises to small firms that span a broad range in terms of company scale and industries. Consequently, its level of dependency on any specific customer is low.

However, the Group's operations could be impacted by convergent changes in IT investment trends by a large number of companies as a result of unexpected changes in the economic environment.

Supplier-related Risks

The OTSUKA Group is supplied with high-quality products, services and technologies (hereafter called "products") by numerous suppliers for respective segments in order to optimally resolve the problems of each customer. While working to deepen its relationship with suppliers to ensure stable supply of these "products," the Group is constantly working to acquire information on newer "products" as well.

However, the Group's operations could be impacted by the inability to supply "products" in the quantity demanded by customers because of insufficient supply of "products" due to issues at supplier sites, as well as by the Group's inability to obtain substitutes.

Information Leakage Risks

The OTSUKA Group possesses an abundance of individual and corporate information pertaining to operations that is handled carefully.

The Group received approval to use the Privacy Mark of the Japan Information Processing Development Corporation, and its Internet Data Center acquired certification for Information Security Management Systems (ISMS).

As a concrete measure to manage data, the Group has released an internal and external Personal Information Protection Policy, as well as established regulations on personal information protection, confidentiality and information system security. The Group has its employees take a pledge of confidentiality as well as works to prevent information leakage outside of the Group and raises awareness of information management through its proprietary educational "CP (Compliance Program) License System" and other measures. Even with these measures, however, the Group's operations could be impacted by assuming liabilities for damage and loss of trust by society in the unlikely event that personal or corporate information is leaked outside the Group.

Sales Summary

In the fiscal year under review, the OTSUKA Group recorded consolidated net sales of ¥429,927 million, a decrease of ¥37,227 million (8.0%) from the previous fiscal year.

System Integration Business

The System Integration business provides optimized system services ranging from consulting to system design and development, transport and installation work and network construction. During the fiscal year, sales of SI-related products declined sharply owing to the adverse effects of curtailments in IT investments by companies. Consequently, net sales in the System Integration business declined 14.9% to ¥226,688 million.

Service and Support Business

The Service and Support business provides customers with total service and support for their business operations and installed systems encompassing supplies, hardware and software maintenance, telephone support and outsourcing. With companies continuing to reduce expenses, our "tanomail" office supply mail-order service business steadily secured an increase in sales due in part to the effects of the implementation of a sales campaign. On the other hand, our "tayoreru" support business recorded sales at a level only slightly above the amount of the previous fiscal year, as customers re-evaluated the contents of their service contracts and cut back on the use of copies. As a result, net sales in the Service and Support business rose 1.1% to ¥200,938 million.

Other Business

In the Other business, net sales increased 20.1% from the previous fiscal year to ¥2,300 million.

Summary of Income and Expenses

Regarding profits, gross profit declined 12.0% to ¥94,490 million due to a decrease in the gross profit margin and lower net sales. Despite efforts to curb selling, general and administrative (SG&A) expenses, operating income declined 40.6% to ¥16,094 million, ordinary income decreased 40.5% to ¥16,427 million, income before income taxes and minority interests decreased 37.4% to ¥16,237 million and net income was down 38.9% to ¥8,782 million. Net income per share amounted to ¥277.92.

Assets

Total assets at fiscal year-end increased ¥1,130 million from the previous fiscal year-end to ¥198,076 million. Current assets increased ¥4,550 million from the previous fiscal year-end to ¥133,729 million due to a rise in cash and time deposits. Fixed assets declined ¥3,420 million from the previous fiscal year-end to ¥64,347 million.

Liabilities

Total liabilities declined ¥3,858 million to ¥95,297 million. Current liabilities declined ¥3,586 million to ¥92,293 million due to a decrease in income taxes payable. Fixed liabilities decreased ¥271 million from the previous fiscal year-end to ¥3,004 million.

Net Assets

Total net assets rose ¥4,989 million from the previous fiscal year-end to ¥102,779 million owing to such factors as an increase in retained earnings. As a result, the equity ratio rose 2.2 percentage points to 51.4%.

The interest coverage ratio was 134.84 times; the interest-bearing debt ratio was 4.38%; return on equity (ROE) was 8.84%; and return on assets (ROA) was 8.23%.

Cash Flows

Cash and cash equivalents at end of year totaled ¥32,806 million, an increase of ¥5,636 million (20.7%) from the end of the previous fiscal year. Factors relating to each cash flow category were as follows.

Cash Flows from Operating Activities

Net cash provided by operating activities increased ¥2,635 million (19.7%) to ¥15,982 million. This was due mainly to a decrease in income taxes paid.

Cash Flows from Investing Activities

Net cash used in investing activities decreased ¥2,033 million (29.2%) to ¥4,927 million. This was due mainly to a decrease in payments for purchase of investments in securities.

Cash Flows from Financing Activities

Net cash used in financing activities increased ¥826 million (18.0%) to ¥5,417 million. This was due mainly to a net decrease in short-term bank loans.

As a result, free cash flows, the sum of cash flows from operating activities and cash flows from investing activities, increased ¥4,668 million to ¥11,054 million.

Forecast

In fiscal 2010, the Company forecasts a 4.9% increase in consolidated net sales to ¥451,000 million, a 3.8% increase in operating income to ¥16,700 million, a 3.5% increase in ordinary income to ¥17,000 million and a 4.3% increase in net income to ¥9,160 million.

By segment, we forecast a 6.0% increase in net sales to ¥240,330 million in the System Integration business, a 3.7% increase to ¥208,340 million in the Service and Support business and a 1.3% rise to ¥2,330 million in the Other business.

OTSUKA CORPORATION and Consolidated Subsidiaries

1. Basis of Presentation of the Consolidated Financial Statements

Accounting Principles

The accompanying consolidated financial statements of OTSUKA CORPORATION (the "Company") and its subsidiaries are prepared on the basis of accounting principles generally accepted in Japan, which are different in certain respects as to the application and disclosure requirements from International Financial Reporting Standards, and are compiled from the consolidated financial statements prepared by the Company as required by the Companies Act and the Financial Instruments and Exchange Law of Japan.

Certain items presented in the consolidated financial statements have been reclassified for the convenience of readers outside Japan.

Certain reclassifications have been made in the consolidated financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2008 to conform to the presentation for the year ended December 31, 2009.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(1) Scope of consolidation

The Company had 12 subsidiaries (majority-owned companies) and 13 subsidiaries as at December 31, 2008 and 2009, respectively. The consolidated financial statements include the accounts of the Company and 8 subsidiaries for the years ended December 31, 2008 and 2009.

The 8 subsidiaries which were consolidated in the year ended December 31, 2009 are listed below:

The Company and its consolidated subsidiaries are hereinafter referred to as the "Companies."

The consolidated subsidiaries listed above apply a fiscal year ending on December 31 of each year, which is the same as that of the Company.

The accounts of the remaining 4 unconsolidated subsidiaries and 5 unconsolidated subsidiaries as at December 31, 2008 and 2009, respectively, consisted of insignificant amounts in terms of total assets, net sales, net income and retained earnings, and have, therefore, been excluded from consolidation.

(2) Investments in unconsolidated subsidiaries and affiliates

The Company had 4 unconsolidated subsidiaries and 9 affiliates at December 31, 2008 and 5 unconsolidated subsidiaries and 9 affiliates at December 31,2009.

The Company had 3 investments in affiliate for the equity method at December 31, 2008 and 2009. Investments in unconsolidated subsidiaries and affiliates not accounted for by the equity method were carried at cost or less, since they did not have a material impact on consolidated net income and retained earnings in the consolidated financial statements.

(3) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents in the consolidated statements of cash flows are composed of cash in hand, bank deposits which can be withdrawn on demand and short-term investments with an original maturity of three months or less and which represent a minor risk of fluctuation in value.

(4) Inventories

Inventories are stated at cost (the book value of inventories on the balance sheet is stated, by writing down based on their decrease in profitability).

(Fiscal year 2009)

Effective the year ended December 31, 2009, the Company and its consolidated subsidiaries adopted the new accounting standard, "Accounting Standard for Measurement of Inventories" issued by the Accounting Standards Board of Japan ("ASBJ") on july 5, 2006.

As a result, operating income and income before income taxes and minority interests decreased by 106 million yen (1,153 thousand U.S. dollars), respectively.

(5) Financial instruments

(a) Securities

Securities held by the Company and its subsidiaries are classified into three categories:

· Held-to-maturity debt securities

Held-to-maturity debt securities are stated using amortized cost method on a straight-line basis.

· Equity investment in subsidiaries and affiliates

Investments of the Company in equity securities issued by unconsolidated subsidiaries and affiliates are accounted for by the equity method. In exceptional cases, investments in certain unconsolidated subsidiaries and affiliates are stated at cost, determined by the moving-average method, because the effect of application of the equity method would be immaterial.

Available-for-sale securities

Securities with market quotations are stated at fair value, based on market prices at the balance sheet date. (Unrealized gains/losses from valuation of marketable securities are charged directly to net assets at a net-of-tax amount, while cost of sale is determined by the moving-average method.)

Securities without market quotations are stated at cost, determined by the moving-average method. Regarding investments in limited partnerships and similar investments, an amount equivalent to the Company's partnership investment gain or loss under the equity method, with such a gain or loss being based on the latest available financial statements of the corresponding limited partnerships, was recognized in the consolidated financial statements.

(b) Derivatives

All derivatives are stated at fair value, with changes in fair value included in net profit or loss for the period in which they arise, except for derivatives that are designated as "hedging instruments."

(c) Hedge accounting

Gains or losses arising from changes in fair value of the derivatives designated as "hedging instruments" are deferred as an asset or liability and included in net profit or loss in the same period during which the gains and losses on the hedged items or transactions are recognized.

The derivatives designated as hedging instruments by the Companies are forward foreign exchange contracts. The related hedged items are accounts payable denominated in foreign currencies.

The Companies have a policy to utilize the above hedging instruments in order to reduce the Companies' exposure to the risks of foreign exchange rate fluctuation. Thus, the Companies' purchases of the hedging instruments are limited to, at maximum, the amounts of the hedged items.

The Company evaluates the effectiveness of its hedging activities by reference to the accumulated gains or losses on the hedging instruments and the related hedged items from the commencement of the hedges.

(6) Property and equipment (excluding lease assets)

Depreciation is computed using the declining-balance method, at rates based on the estimated useful lives of assets, which are prescribed by Japanese income tax laws. Depreciation of buildings newly acquired after April 1, 1998 has been provided based on the straight-line method in conformity with Japanese tax laws.

Estimated useful lives of assets are principally as follows: Building and structures — 15 to 50 years Other — 4 to 6 years

Normal repairs and maintenance, including minor renewals and improvements, are charged to income as incurred.

(7) Accounting for leases

Effective from the current fiscal year, finance leases that do not transfer ownership of the leased assets to the lessee are depreciated using the straight-line method over the period of the lease, with zero residual value.

Previously, the Company and its domestic consolidated subsidiaries treated finance leases that do not transfer ownership of the leased assets to the lessee as operating leases. Effective from the current fiscal year, however, the Company and its domestic consolidated subsidiaries have applied "Accounting Standard for Lease Transactions" (ASBJ, Statement No.13, March 30, 2007; revised from standard originally issued by the Corporate Accounting Counneil on June 17 ,1993) and "Guidance on Accounting Standard for Lease Transactions" (ASBJ, Guidance No.16, March 30, 2007; revised from the standard originally issued by the Japanese Institute of Certified Public Accountants on January 18, 1994). Accordingly, from the current fiscal year, the Company and its domestic consolidated subsidiaries have treated such leases as capital leases.

For finance leases that do not transfer ownership of the leased assets to the lessee commencing on or before December 31, 2008, they will continue to be accounted for by a method corresponding to that used for operating leases.

There was no effect of this change on operating income, income before income taxes and minority interests and net income in the current fiscal year.

(8) Software and other intangible assets(excluding lease assets)

Development costs of computer software to be sold are amortized based on the estimated volume of sales or the estimated sales revenue with the minimum amortization amount calculated based on a useful life of three years.

Software developed for internal use is amortized on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful life of the asset, which is mainly 5 years.

Other intangible assets with finite useful lives are amortized using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives.

(9) Accounting for income taxes

Income taxes of the Company and its domestic subsidiaries consist of corporate income taxes, local inhabitant taxes and enterprise taxes.

The Company and its subsidiaries have adopted the deferred tax accounting method. Income taxes were determined using the asset and liability approach, whereby deferred tax assets and liabilities were recognized in respect of temporary differences between the tax basis of assets and liabilities and those as reported in the consolidated financial statements.

(10) Allowance for doubtful accounts

An allowance for doubtful accounts is provided at an amount of potential losses from uncollectable receivables based on the historical rate of losses from bad debts for ordinary receivables, and on the estimated collectability of receivables from companies in financial difficulty.

(11) Allowance for investment loss

An allowance for investment loss is provided at an estimated amount of possible investment losses for investment in affiliates etc., based on the financial condition of the investees.

(Fiscal year 2009)

Effective the year ended December 31, 2009, an allowance for investment loss is provided at an estimated amount of possible investment losses for investment in affiliates etc., based on the financial condition of the investees. As a result, income before income taxes and minority interests decreased by 34 million yen (375 thousand U.S. dollars).

(12) Reserve for retirement benefits

(a) Retirement benefits for employees

The reserve for retirement benefits represents the estimated present value of projected benefit obligations in excess of the fair value of the plan assets, the unrecognized actuarial differences are amortized on a straight-line basis over a period of 12 years from the year following the year in which they arise, and the unrecognized prior service cost is amortized on a straight-line basis over a period of 12 years.

(b) Retirement benefits for directors

The Company and seven consolidated subsidiaries have provided for accrued retirement benefits to directors at an amount equivalent to 100% of the benefits the Company would be required to pay, had all eligible directors retired at the balance sheet date.

(13) Net income and dividends per share

Net income per common share is based upon the weighted average number of common shares outstanding during each year. Cash dividends per share shown for each year in the consolidated statements of income represent dividends declared as applicable to the respective year.

Diluted net income per common share assumes full exercise of outstanding stock options which have a dilutive effect.

(14) Accounting for the consumption tax

The Japanese Consumption Tax Law generally imposes consumption tax at a flat rate on all domestic consumption of goods and services. The consumption tax withheld upon sale is not included in the amount of "Net sales" in the accompanying consolidated statements of income but is recorded as a liability. Consumption tax, which is paid by the Company and domestic subsidiaries on purchases of goods and services, is not included in the amounts of costs/expenses in the consolidated statements of income, but is offset against the balance withheld, and the net balance is included in "Other current liabilities" in the consolidated balance sheets.

(15) Rounding of amounts

Amounts of less than a million yen have been omitted.

3. U.S. Dollar Amounts

Amounts in U.S. dollars are included solely for the convenience of readers outside Japan. The rate of ¥92.07=US\$1, the rate of exchange on December 31, 2009, has been used in translation. The inclusion of such amounts is not intended to imply that Japanese yen have been or could be readily converted, realized of settled in U.S. dollars at this or any other rate.

5. Derivative Information

The Companies utilize derivative transactions for the purpose of hedging their exposure to fluctuation in foreign exchange rates on payables denominated in foreign currencies, however, do not enter into transactions involving derivatives for speculative purposes.

The derivatives designated as hedging instruments by the Companies are forward foreign exchange contracts.

The related hedged items are accounts payable denominated in foreign currencies.

That remains the risk of foreign currency exchange fluctuations on currency transactions. As the Companies enter into derivative transactions only with financial institutions which have high credit ratings, we believe that a credit risk is insignificant.

All risk hedge operations and management are carried out pursuant to the Companies' rules which stipulate management policies of derivative transactions, limitation of a hedging position and so forth by treasury department with an appropriate approval.

13. Shareholders' Equity

The Companies Act of Japan provides that an amount equal to 10% of the amount to be distributed as distributions of capital surplus (other than the capital reserve) and retained earnings (other than the legal reserve) be transferred to the capital reserve and the legal reserve, respectively, until the sum of the capital reserve and the legal reserve equals 25% of the common stock account. Such distributions can be made at any time by resolution of the shareholders, or by the Board of Directors if certain conditions are met, but neither the capital reserve nor the legal reserve is available for distributions.

14. Land Revaluation

Pursuant to the Law Concerning Land Revaluation, the Company revalued land used for business activities on December 31, 2001. The excess of the revalued carrying amount over the book value before revaluation was recorded as "Revaluation difference on land" net assets in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets. The land prices used for the revaluation were determined based on the prices in the official notice published by the Commissioner of the National Tax Agency in accordance with Article 2, Paragraphs 3 and 4 of the Enforcement Ordinance Concerning Land Revaluation, after making reasonable adjustments. Revaluation is permitted for one time only. The excess of the book value after revaluation over the fair value are 672 million yen and 539 million yen (5,860 thousand U.S. dollars) at December 31, 2008 and 2009, respectively.


